It's that sad time of the year again when the season is drawing to a close and we take our boats home one more time. It also heralds the Prizegiving night followed by the AGM and It is with the AGM in mind that I write this report and review the season just gone by.

1997 started well for the Club, with the annual football match against Pentewan Sands SC. and boy was it cold! For the first time in many years we actually won the match. I can see us carrying on with that success for quite a few years to come as we have an excellent crop of good young footballers.

The sailing season started as usual at the end of March with the Easter Cup. Now I know that we always moan about the weather, but this year's weather must have been the strangest for many years. We seem to have alternated month by month with dry and wet spells. The winds have been very fickle too. The majority of our races have been held in lighter than normal north westerlies which certainly belies our usual claim of a south westerly air flow. Looking back at my records, May seemed to be the only consistent month for regular sailing. June, July, August and September were heavily interrupted with Open Meetings, Nationals, Regattas and periods of very light winds or strong South Easterlies. August was particularly bad, we even lost the Polkerris day sail and almost lost the Regatta due to the light winds. The almost total calm kept the Pentewan fleet at home and so all the prizes stayed within the Club. The social, on Regatta night, saw a bulging Clubhouse, combining Karaoke, Dennis's birthday party, with extra entertainment!! plus a bracing swim for some brave souls afterwards. Nigel excelled again, ably helped by Tim and managed to wear the

Karaoke machine out. The amplifier overheated and died on us.

The sailing programme was so disrupted that the summer Sunday series which was scheduled for 14 races was actually decided on 5 races. Even now as we are entering October we are again bedevilled with strange conditions. Some of us even sailed in tee shirts and shorts on the first Sunday in October, though as I write this the rain and winds have swept back.

The Contender and RS Open meeting was a very windy affair and proved testing for all those who sailed, launching into a south easterly and the many capsizes, gave good viewing for the spectators. The Enterprise and Laser Open was very well attended by visitors, but shame to all our Laser sailors who declined to enter. These events are put on to promote the Classes and it does enable people to test their skills against different opposition. The Tasar Open meeting saw all the Club boats competing with a healthy entry of visitors coming from as far away as Wales and London.

The big event of the year was the Scorpion Nationals. I must congratulate you the members for putting on a really fantastic week. We were blessed with what turned out to be the best week's weather for sailing over the entire season, and this helped to make the Nationals a huge success. The Club pulled together magnificently. This was reflected by the numerous compliments that came back to me time after time from our visitors. The only poor thing about the week was the low turnout from the Scorpions, only 43 boats, which is a far cry from the first Scorpion Nationals here when the entry was over 100. Anyway we still managed to make a good profit for the Club funds, somewhere in the region of £3000. A full report on that will be presented at the AGM. One thing that we will be spending some money on soon is to replace the balcony which is in a very poor state of repair.

Membership has grown this year, by the appearance of the sea cadets, RAF St. Mawgan and Penrice school. It is pleasing to see quite a few younger people sailing. A strong youth section is essential for future growth and to help some of us older members pull our boats up the slipway. It is also encouraging to gain other new members especially those who buy boats and join in the racing. Cornwall is not one of the more prosperous areas in the Country and we don't have that many active people moving into the area, so our growth potential is not too good. However by bringing friends along we do have the opportunity to introduce potential members to our sport.

A few congratulations to some of our sailors. Firstly to Rob Barnes who helmed at the Bosun Nationals in Plymouth and was sailing well until the strong winds came along and ruined his chances. The cadets who sailed well at the schools Championships at Grafam Water. Congratulations to Paul & John Jenkin who managed a creditable 4th on the blowy day in the Scorpion Championships. Congratulations to Stacey Bray who came 2nd in the Dutch Nationals and sailed well in the British Nationals, leading the fleet on more than one occasion. Congratulations to Jeremy & Nic who attended the RS400 Nationals and well placed even though the winds were much stronger than they would have liked, and congratulations to Neil and myself who managed to win a race at this years Tasar Nationals.

Word of our successful Scorpion Nationals has prompted the Tasar Committee to ask Porthpean to host their Nationals again next year. This was brought up at a recent committee meeting and enthusiastically accepted. So beware we will be doing it all again next year at the same time which will be July 25th to July 31st. The Largest fleet that the Tasars have had at a Nationals was 40 boats when we held the Nationals here in 1991. I expect that we will equal that and hopefully beat it by at least 5. Should we make another £3000 then we will be in a strong financial position.

The Prizegiving dinner will be held on the 14th of November at the Cliff Head Hotel. Full details elsewhere in this newsletter. This is always a very popular event and I would like to see as many people as possible attending. Peter Phillips is kindly organising it again this year. Now I appeal to you, please let Peter know as soon as possible should you be attending. He shouldn't have to go around ringing people up to find out if they are coming.

Enclosed with this newsletter is notice of the AGM. This event is not always that well attended. Cold, dark winter evenings are not the most conducive to good attendance's, but it is an important meeting as the Officers and Committee for the forthcoming year will be chosen. Fortunately the Club is in a strong financial position. This has been achieved by hard work and good housekeeping. Membership is healthy at the moment, morale is good and race attendance's have been slightly better than last year. It is important that this continues if the Club is to remain prosperous. We have had a good influx of new members, and it would be beneficial to try and encourage one or two new faces onto the Committee.

I have been very proud to have been Commodore for the last three years, and have enjoyed the experience immensely. I have been blessed with a very good team to help run the Club. There is no set time limit for holding this Office, however I feel it is in the best interests of the Club if I stand down at this AGM and hand over to someone else. I would like to take this opportunity to pay tribute to the Officers and Committee and other ex Commodores from whom I have relied on for advice and thank you all for the support that I have experienced over my three years. I think Sue will be very relieved that I stand down as she won't have to present all those prizes after Open Meetings etc. Still she will miss all those kisses she has enjoyed.!!






